Social reintegration, support for peace Karazin University is Participating in Training for Coaches of Future Veteran Assistants





In Kyiv, training for coaching teams of future veteran assistants at the regional level is currently underway. This initiative is organized by the Ministry of Veterans Affairs of Ukraine with the generous support of UNDP in Ukraine and international donors. Twenty scientists and educators from leading higher education institutions are undergoing an intensive course titled 'Theory and Practice of Training Specialists in the Support of War Veterans and Demobilized Persons,' which is a part of the experimental project initiated by the Ministry of Veterans Affairs to introduce the concept of veteran assistants in Ukraine. Among the participants are also experts from the National Aviation University (Kyiv), Zhytomyr Polytechnic State University, and Sumy State University, as well as representatives from Kryvyi Rih. During three days of training, participants develop an understanding of the process of preparing specialists who will support veterans and demobilized individuals within the approved qualification improvement program. They also examine theoretical and practical aspects of veteran support during the transition from military service to civilian life, including psychological and communication nuances in working with veterans and their families, organization of work, and document flow for specialists in veteran support, among other topics.

The introduction of the Veteran's

Assistant Institute is aimed at supporting peace and social cohesion in a post-conflict society.

Establishing a systemic support framework for veterans is a tool for building trust, justice, and social adaptation.

Karazin University Representatives Participated in the International Scientific Congress in Lithuania. Discussion of new challenges for historians in times of change

From September 15 to 17, the International Congress titled "Reimagining Ukraine and Europe: New Challenges for Historians" was held at Vilnius University in Lithuania. The event was organized by 17 European institutions, including the Research Council of Lithuania, the Government of Lithuania, the German Historical Institute in Warsaw, and others. The forum brought together more than 100 researchers representing Ukraine, Lithuania, Germany, Poland, the United Kingdom, France, and other countries. The congress discussions covered the development of a new narrative for the history of Ukraine and the entire Central and Eastern European region. The work was organized into 18 sections, and there were also presentations on international grant programs and several panel discussions.







The congress, which brought together representatives from various countries to discuss historical issues, helps promote peace and stability through academic and cultural exchange. Discussions on history, forced migration, and research methodology contribute to greater understanding and reconciliation between nations — an important step toward strengthening global stability and justice.

Official Conferment of Honorary Doctorate Attributes to American Historian and Writer Timothy Snyder at Karazin University

This is a prestigious university with significant historical importance. It is a great honor for me that this conferment is taking place right here within the ministry.'

Preparing citizens for responsible risk management and conflict prevention. The Course "Society of Risk: Living Studying, Managing"



This course has been developed as part of the Ukrainian-Swedish project "Risk and Crisis Management Education for a Safer Ukraine" (SAFE Ukraine), which is implemented by the School of Sociology at V.N. Karazin Kharkiv National University and the School The course is practice-oriented and aims to develop students' analytical skills in managing social risks in various life situations, including communication, labor relations, project management, organizational development, and daily life.of Sociology at the University of Central Sweden (Östersund). The course includes the following activities: Lectures and practical sessions (including joint sessions with Swedish students). Top-performing students who participate in the "Society of Risk: Living, Studying, Managing" course will have the opportunity to attend a winter school at the University of Central Sweden in January 2024. Participation in the development of a handbook for schoolchildren on risk recognition and prevention. Receipt of certificates of completion for this course. The course is taught in Ukrainian, but knowledge of English is required for participation in seminars with Swedish students. Proficiency in English at a high level is an important criterion for the competitive selection process for the winter school in Sweden.



Promoting the creation of peaceful, just, and inclusive societies

From October 2023, the cooperation between Karazin University and the Kharkiv Regional Center for Social Services in the field of professional development for social workers from relevant units of local territorial communities in the Kharkiv region will continue.

In recent years, including the wartime period, thanks to the Department of Sociology of Management and Social Work of the School of Sociology and the organizational work of the Center for Postgraduate Education, an effective mechanism has been established for conducting lectures and practical classes for the relevant category of potential informal education applicants. During a working meeting with representatives of the Kharkiv Regional Center for Social Services, the director of the Center for Postgraduate Education, Mykhailo Tatarinov, discussed the specifics of the educational process for the 2023/2024 academic year, the content, and the directions of classes for potential interested participants.

"It is difficult to make plans for the future because our main plan is to win the war. And as quickly as possible."

This statement was made by "Lastivka," a graduate of the School of Radio Physics of Karazin Kharkiv National University (now RBECS), a current military servicewoman standing in defense of Ukraine today.

Karazin University conducted an interview with Lastivka about her life before and during the war, daily life on the front line, and the challenges of the present. This is a story of a brave young woman who chose not to remain indifferent.

The 180th Anniversary of the Birth of Distinguished Bibliographer Mykhailo Komarov







January 23, 2024 is the 180th anniversary of the birth of Mykhailo Fedorovych Komarov. Mykhailo Komarov is a bibliographer, ethnographer, folklorist, lexicographer, and the compiler of the first bibliographical index of works by Taras Shevchenko and works about him. He was a graduate of Kharkiv University.

Mykhailo Komarov is one of the founders of Ukrainian bibliography. He began his bibliographical studies in Kyiv, becoming the first bibliographer of works by Taras Shevchenko and works about him. He viewed bibliography not only as a summary of already developed and published material necessary for various scientific disciplines and the dissemination of knowledge but also believed that bibliographic information is a source for reproducing an objective picture of the current state of science and culture.

Mykhailo Fedorovych became a pioneer in Ukrainian personal bibliography and Shevchenko studies. He also compiled personal bibliographical guides dedicated to the life and work of Petro Hulak-Artemovsky, Stepan Rudansky, Ivan Kotliarevsky, and Mykola Lysenko.

Through his diverse activities in the field of Ukrainian science and culture, Mykhailo Komarov made a significant contribution to Ukraine's cultural and national heritage.

Honoring the legacy of Mykhailo Komarov, the founder of Ukrainian bibliography and a promoter of national culture, is a direct contribution to access to knowledge and cultural heritage — through the development of open science, preservation of cultural heritage, access to information, and the strengthening of national scientific and cultural institutions.

The University Celebrates UN International Day of Education

And despite all this, the university continues to educate students, preserve and modernize the intellectual potential of Kharkiv region and Ukraine.

The names of Karazin University graduates are immortalized in geographical names, names of space objects, plants, minerals, laws and formulas. International Holocaust Remembrance Day: The University Pays Tribute

On November 1, 2005, the United Nations General Assembly adopted a resolution, co-sponsored by almost 100 countries, with Ukraine being one of the initiators of signing this document. The resolution is aimed not only at preserving the memory of the innocently persecuted but also emphasizing the necessity of fostering tolerance, understanding, and respect for human rights.

The university serves as a center for studying and understanding the lessons of the past to shape a successful future, an environment where everyone can freely express their thoughts, feel respect for the dignity of every individual, and receive support.

On International Holocaust Remembrance Day, we honor the memory of millions of people who fell victim to the most heinous crimes in the history of humanity. According to statistics, among the 6 million Jewish victims of Nazi terror, over 1.5 million were our fellow citizens. The tragedy also claimed the lives of workers and students of Karazin University: over 20 students and professors were annihilated solely based on their national identity.







At Karazin University, we see this day as more than remembrance — it is a commitment to action.

Our university stands as a center for education, dialogue, and reflection, where the lessons of the past are studied to build a more peaceful and just future. It is an environment where freedom of expression, human dignity, and support for every individual are fundamental principles.

Furthermore, Vasily Karazin contributed to the development of scientific research activities, supporting innovative research and the development of new technologies (Goal 9 - Industry, Innovation, and Infrastructure). He actively worked towards stimulating the rational use of natural resources, contributing to the sustainable development of cities and communities (Goal 11), mitigating the consequences of climate change (Goal 13), and protecting and restoring terrestrial ecosystems (Goal 15).

Supporting human rights and equality



On February 11th, the world celebrates the International Day of Women and Girls in Science. This holiday, declared by the United Nations General Assembly, has been observed since 2016.

Its goal is to promote full and equal access for women and girls to science, ensuring gender equality and expanding their rights and opportunities. According to UNESCO's research in Ukraine, 44.7% of women are scientists, marking one of the highest percentages among European countries.

Karazin University has always supported the idea of equal rights, freedoms, and opportunities. Regardless of age or gender, everyone has the opportunity to receive a quality education. This belief was shared by the university's founder, Vasily Karazin, who in 1842 argued for the importance of girls receiving education. However, they gained this right only after the activist's death.

The first Honorary Doctorate for a woman was awarded at Karazin University. This happened in 1910 when the historian Oleksandra Yefymenko joined the ranks of Honorary Doctors. In 1935, the university welcomed its first female professor, Klara Roll. The community of Karazin University has, does, and will have many outstanding women scientists in both exact and humanitarian sciences. In 2023, four women achieved the title of professor, and 21 women were granted the title of associate professor.

The university congratulates every woman and girl who contributes to the science of Ukraine and the world! We wish for new achievements, success, and discoveries.

Commemorating the anniversary of the adoption of the trident as a state symbol supports the values of peace, justice, and the strengthening of institutions — ideas embodied in SDG 16.



Today we celebrate the 32nd anniversary of the establishment of one of Ukraine's national symbols. On February 19, 1992, the Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine approved the trident as the Small Coat of Arms of Ukraine, defining it as the main element of the large State Emblem of Ukraine. It is a golden Trident on a blue shield.

The golden Trident has long been a national symbol of Ukrainians, in particular during the liberation struggle of the 20th century. Its earliest images date back to the tenth century.

Back in the twentieth century, Mykhailo Hrushevsky wrote in his article "The Ukrainian Emblem": "The significance of the Trident as a symbol was exceptional... The Trident is a symbol of freedom and independence of the Ukrainian people, nation and state."

Through the centuries, the Trident has united generations of our people in the struggle for freedom and independence of the state. Today, as it was a century ago, the Trident serves as a talisman for our military and all Ukrainians who resist the enemy.

Let us honor the national symbols of Ukraine!

Day of the Heavenly Hundred Heroes: the University remembers

Her boundless resilience and strength helped her continue her life path. The book "Captivity" is about all the circles of hell that the author experienced for almost a year.

As "Nava" noted, it is important for the theme of the liberation of Azovstal defenders to be one of the leading topics in the media and emphasized the importance of supporting captive defenders: "When we saw that so many people came out to protest in Kyiv and other cities, it helped us a lot in rehabilitation. It was this understanding that we were awaited."

We thank Valeriya for the courage to tell her story. We believe that all Ukrainian defenders will return home from captivity.

130th Anniversary of the Birth of the World-Renowned Astronomer, Rector of Karazin University, Academician Mykola Barabashov







The activity of the prominent scientist, academician Mykola Barabashov, is known not only in Ukraine but also far beyond its borders. Mykola Pavlovych dedicated his life to the study of the bodies of the Solar System and was one of the founders of the essentially new science of planetology, conducting research on the Moon and planets during the early period of humanity's space exploration.

Mykola Barabashov was born in Kharkiv on March 30, 1894, into an intellectual family. As a child, he loved classical music and played the violin himself, studied diligently, and read a lot. Astronomy captured his imagination in his early years. At the age of 15, he was already publishing his observations of sunspots, Venus, and Mars.

The scientist's merits to national science and higher education were duly appreciated. In particular, a minor planet No. 2883 was named after him, and on Mars, in the northern hemisphere, there is a crater named after Barabashov. Overall, over 40 objects in the Solar System (craters on the Moon, Mars, and Venus, minor planets) were named after astronomers from Kharkiv University - Mykola Pavlovych's teachers and many of his students. A street and a metro station in Kharkiv were named after him.

Research in the field of lunar and planetary physics brought wide popularity not only to Mykola Barabashov but also to the Kharkiv Astronomical Observatory. The planetary school of Kharkiv, created by Mykola Pavlovych Barabashov, continues to actively conduct its research, continuing the glorious traditions of its Teacher. This is a tribute to the memory of the scientist, for whom the study of the bodies of the Solar System was the meaning of his entire life.

According to the memories of Professor Dmytro Lupishko, the founder of the Kharkiv asteroid scientific school, a student of academician Mykola Barabashov.

V. N. Karazin Kharkiv National University and the Kharkiv Astronomical Observatory, whose work continues the legacy of Mykola Barabashov, are vivid examples of strong scientific and educational institutions that foster a scientific culture based on objectivity, transparency, and critical thinking.

Honoring Mykola Barabashov is not just a tribute to an outstanding scientist — it is a demonstration of support for strong scientific institutions, the development of international scientific cooperation, and the fight for truth, justice, and access to knowledge.

This problem jeopardizes the lives and health of the local population, especially children and youth, who often become victims of unexploded ordnance.

On this day, we call on everyone to join in promoting knowledge about mine danger and the importance of correct reactions when encountering suspicious objects. The Ministry of Reintegration reminds of the basic rules to protect yourself and your loved ones from explosive hazards:

- Do not approach suspicious objects and never touch them with your hands.

- Walk only on familiar and verified routes.

Every April 11th, at the initiative of the UN, the world observes a significant date - International Day of Liberation of Prisoners from Nazi Concentration Camps, to honor the memory of the millions of people who fell victim to the Nazi regime during World War II.

There were approximately 14,000 concentration camps in Germany and around 817 Nazi concentration camps for the forced detention of civilians and prisoners of war in other countries, three of which were located in Kyiv.

This day serves as a reminder of the horrific crimes against humanity, the importance of unity in the fight for the dignity and freedom of every individual, regardless of their race, religion, or nationality. During World War II, 18 million people were imprisoned in concentration camps, of whom over 11 million were killed.

Despite all this, Ukrainians are once again forced to experience the horrors of war. With the onset of brutal Russian aggression, hundreds of our military personnel are in Russian captivity in appalling conditions. They return exhausted and sick, but unbroken.

We hope that all Ukrainian prisoners currently held in Russian camps will return to their families! We remember the terrible pages of history in order to overcome the enemy that threatens not only Ukraine but the entire civilized world, its security, and stability.

Day of the First Constitution of Ukraine Establishment





The event dedicated to Pylyp Orlyk's Constitution at Karazin University directly advances UN SDG 16 by:

- * Upholding the rule of law;
- * Promoting the historical foundations of democratic governance;
- * Developing legal and civic awareness;
- * Supporting the building of strong, accountable, and just institutions. This serves as a reminder that the pursuit of democracy, justice, and peace is not new for Ukraine but has deep historical roots, making this Goal especially meaningful in our national context.



April 16 (5), 1710 marks an important historical moment: in the light of the Enlightenment era, Ukraine took a significant step in its development by adopting its first Constitution.

The "Pacts and Constitutions of Laws and Freedoms of the Zaporozhian Host," signed by Hetman Pylyp Orlyk and the Koshovyi Otaman Kost Hordiienko on behalf of the Zaporozhian Cossacks, became the source of progressive ideas and democratic principles.

Ukraine, recognized as a significant force on the political map of Europe, defined rights and duties, relations between the hetman and the Cossack council, and the foundations of its state system in this legal document. Pylyp Orlyk's Constitution is a remarkable historical monument of Ukrainian and European thought of the 18th century, laying the groundwork for Ukrainian constitutionalism.

This historical moment testifies to the high level of development of Ukrainian statehood, the nation's confidence in its future, and its aspiration towards democratic values.

Karazin University Celebrates the 170th Anniversary of the Birth of University Graduate, Academician Mykola Sumtsov







April 18, 2024 marks the 170th anniversary of the birth of the distinguished graduate of Karazin University, historian, ethnographer, and folklorist Mykola Fedorovych Sumtsov.

Born in 1854, Mykola Sumtsov spent his entire life in Kharkiv and devoted many years to the revival of Ukrainian national culture.

Mykola Fedorovych received his higher education at Karazin University, and in 1889, he was appointed as a professor at the university. For over 20 years, he headed the Kharkiv Historical-Philological Society, editing all its collections, and chaired its Pedagogical Department (1908).

Mykola Sumtsov was one of the initiators of the establishment of the Ukrainian Academy of Sciences and the opening of the Public Library in Kharkiv (now the V. G. Korolenko Kharkiv State Scientific Library). He authored over 1,500 scholarly and popular works on Ukrainian folklore, ethnography, and the history of Ukrainian literature from the 18th to the 20th centuries.

The scholar worked on creating a systematic history of Ukrainian literature from the 17th to the 18th centuries, compiled a Ukrainian literature anthology, and wrote extensively on the history of Western European literature, fine arts, and the history of our university.

In 1907, it was Mykola Sumtsov who first among the Kharkiv professorship began lecturing in Ukrainian. He was known as an advocate and popularizer of Ukrainian national culture, actively defending the right to the existence of the Ukrainian language in printed publications and during the teaching of academic disciplines in primary, secondary, and higher education.

The works of Mykola Fedorovych are recognized not only in Ukraine but also beyond its borders. They have retained their value and continue to influence contemporary science, serving as the basis for further research in the field of ethnography and the history of Ukrainian and Slobozhanshchyna cultures.

Commemorating the figure of Mykola Sumtsov at Karazin University directly contributes to the implementation of UN SDG 16 through:

- * Preserving and promoting national cultural heritage;
- * Supporting linguistic equality and the right to education;
- * Developing strong scientific and cultural institutions;
- * Fostering a just, inclusive, and peaceful society.

This is an example of how historical figures, science, and culture serve as pillars for justice, democracy, and national unity.

The University Celebrates the 179th Anniversary of the Birth of Ilya Mechnikov





Commemorating the memory of Ilya Mechnikov at Karazin University demonstrates how education, science, and the development of strong institutions can promote peace, justice, and sustainable development — the core components of UN SDG 16. It also highlights the university's role as a platform for shaping responsible and educated citizens capable of building a just and peaceful society.



On May 15, 1845, in the village of Ivanivka, Kupyansk (now the village is called Mechnikove), Ilya Mechnikov was born. He became the first person of Ukrainian descent to receive the Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine.

Ilya Mechnikov had a thirst for knowledge from a young age. In the 6th grade, he visited a university professor of embryology with a request to study protoplasm under his guidance. However, the boy was refused, as "he should finish gymnasium and enter the university." So he did: he graduated from the Second Kharkiv Gymnasium with a gold medal, and in 1862 he entered the Natural Science department of the School of Physics-mathematics of Karazin University.

By the way, Ilya Ilyich completed his studies at the university in two years (instead of the standard four), brilliantly passed his final exams, and in December 1864, at the age of 19, he became a phd in physical-mathematical sciences.

In 1908, the Nobel Committee awarded the prize to Ilya Mechnikov, and soon the scientist received an invitation to the award ceremony. However, Ilya Ilyich declined the invitation, as to his great regret, he had to refrain, since this time was during lectures at the Pasteur Institute, where his presence was absolutely necessary. And already in June 1909, Mechnikov arrived in Stockholm to deliver the Nobel lecture "The Present State of the Question of Immunity in Infectious Diseases."

Day of Remembrance for the Victims of the Genocide of the Crimean Tatar People: 80th Anniversary of Deportation







In 2024, it will be the 80th anniversary of the deportation of the Crimean Tatar people from the territory of the Crimean Peninsula by the Soviet totalitarian regime in 1944.

The deportation of the Crimean Tatar people was the culmination of russian colonial policy aimed at de-Tatarizing Crimea. During military operations, while men were on the front lines, the Soviet authorities deceitfully expelled children, women, and the elderly from their homes and sent them into exile — a path that for many became their last. After the end of World War II, almost 9,000 Crimean Tatar soldiers and officers were sent to places of deportation or labor camps. Crimean Tatars were not only deprived of their homeland but also of their own names, language, history, and identity.

The genocide was also exemplified by the actions of the Soviet regime in erasing the memory of Crimean Tatars from the history of the Crimean Peninsula: Crimean history was revised, russian imperial narratives were introduced, and myths were deliberately and massively disseminated. And today, the occupying country uses this narrative to spread language of hostility, oppression, and discord in temporarily occupied Crimea.

Commemorating the anniversary of the deportation of the Crimean Tatar people at Karazin University contributes to the formation of a just society based on remembrance, human rights, respect for cultural diversity, and the prevention of the repetition of crimes from the totalitarian past.

It is about truth, justice, and dignity — the foundation of peace and resilient institutions.

The Ukrainian people, who have experienced persecution and repression and have also become victims of the Soviet genocide (Holodomor 1932–1933), fully understand and share the pain of the deportation. The genocide of the Crimean Tatar people is a shared tragedy, a tragedy of the Ukrainian people.

As long as crimes against humanity are not adequately assessed, there is always the possibility of a repetition of the terrible practice of destroying national communities, which is being carried out by russia today. Ukraine is working to have the genocide of the Crimean Tatar people recognized at the international level, as well as by other nations that have suffered from similar crimes of totalitarian regimes.
